## Editorial

Mr. Abdulkarim I. Al Arhabi became Minister of Social Affairs and Labour in the Old City Sanaa

On August 22<sup>nd</sup> five projects for restoration of maqashem (traditional gardens) in the Old City of Sana'a were inaugurated. The restored maqashem are: Dawood, al-Jala, Ibn al-Hussain, al-Washali and Jamal al-Deen. Additionally, corner stones were laid for restoration of another three maqashem: Muaad, al-Dar al-Jadeed and Mosa. The Social Fund invested \$500,000 from projects from funds provided by the food aid program of the United States of America to Yemen.

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During the implementation of these projects, 12,000 tons of garbage and solid waste were removed from these maqashem. Further restoration activities included building and repairing maqashem surrounding and repairing the irrigation network including restoring cisterns and canals using qudad (a traditional cement). Additionally, the projects provided qashameen (maqashem keepers) with seeds and incentives to cultivate the gardens and restore their former agricultural production.

The inaugural ceremony was attended by Mr. Ali Al-Anisi Director of the Presidential Office, Mr. Qassem al-A'ejam, Minister of Endowments and Guidance, Mr. Ahmed al-Kohlani, Mayor of Sana'a City, Mr. Abdulrahman Tarmoom, Vice Minister of Planning and Development, the Executive Director for Preservation of Historic Cities, the Deputy Minister of Culture, a number of other Yemeni Officials and H.E. Barbara Bodine, the United States Ambassador to Sana'a.

## Editorial

An essential feature of the Social Fund is its commitment to achieving its objectives. One of its most important objectives is targeting interventions to address the needs of the poorest and the most disadvantaged social groups. Achieving this objective includes reaching beneficiaries even when located in remote and isolated communities.

Additionally, to effectively respond to the development needs of poor communities and disadvantaged groups, it is essential to involve them in all stages of the project cycle beginning with identification, planning, and contributing to the cost of projects, as well as during project implementation and operation stages.

Thus, during the third quarter of this year, an intensive training of project officers and consultants engaged in SFD projects was conducted. This consisted of four workshops to upgrade community participation skills and the application of participatory rural appraisal methodologies.

Community participation is both a policy choice and a course of action practiced by SFD as a key component in sustainable development.

## Units News Infrastructure Unit

### Education

A workshop was held to prepare for the field activities of the Girls' Education Program Pilot Phase. Twenty consultants participated in the workshop during which constraints in education for rural girls and community participation techniques were discussed.

In its efforts to continually improve project tools and mechanisms, project documents were further developed utilizing a new data summary format which will be attached to project proposals presented to SFD approval committees. The new format includes information on school catchment areas, ages of children enrolled in basic education, current and projected enrollment rates, and assesses proposed interventions in light of data and desired improvements.

Comprehensive educational databases for 1999/2000 have been distributed to SFD branch offices for the project preparation phase. The statistics specialist from the Programming and Evaluation Unit illustrated use of the databases to the SFD branch staff during his branch visits.

The Unit participated in a workshop organized by the Ministry of Education on "Basic Education Development Strategy" (BEDS) that was held September 22<sup>nd</sup> - 24<sup>th</sup>, 2001.

### Feeder Roads

SFD branch offices hired seven consultants for development, implementation, monitoring and follow-up of feeder road projects. The consultants attended a workshop which covered SFD's policies and intervention criteria in this field. As a result, SFD's total investment in feeder roads is expected to expand by the end of this year.

### Cultural Heritage

The Social Fund commissioned a renowned Italian firm specializing in conservation and archeology (Centro di Conservazione Archeologica, Rome) to assess the condition of the painted wooden ceilings in the Great Mosque Sana'a'. This Yemeni structure is the most outstanding example in both quality and quantity of painted medieval woodwork on the Arabian Peninsula. This firm submitted a study which included a conservation plan for restoring this national treasure.

## Water and Environment Unit

Activities that the Unit has participated during this quarter include:

- Proposing to modify procedures and project components for water harvesting projects. The proposal was internally discussed and approved by the Social Fund and it has been integrated within all branches, thus enhancing project implementation. The new procedures base payments (for direct contracting to the community) on completed work. Additionally, household water filters have been included as a component in all

## Training Unit

During the third quarter 17 projects were contracted, four of these are completed and 13 projects are under implementation. The seventeen projects included:

- Three training courses promoting the capacities of veterinary and animal husbandry extension agents and three courses promoting the capacities of agriculture extension agents for participants from the Ministry of Agriculture in Ibb, Dhamar and Hadhramout;
  - Two training of trainers courses in various agricultural fields for beneficiaries from the Ministry of Agriculture in Ibb and Dhamar;
  - One course in the principles of accounts and bookkeeping from NGOs working with special needs' groups in a number of governorates;
  - Four TOT training programs in handicraft production for participants from the National Program for Productive Families and various NGOs in San'a';
  - Three training programs with executive committees of nine NGOs in San'a' in financial management, marketing, product design and development. An Egyptian consultancy firm prepared training manuals and is in the process of implementing training programs. Local trainers from various governorates are participating in these training programs in order to subsequently train local NGO executive committees.
  - One project for al-Khansa'a Women's Social Charitable Association in Bani Imara, al-Mahweet. The project includes: promoting the capacities of trainers responsible for the association's internal training activities; providing a trainer to train trainers in sewing and embroidery; providing some necessary equipment and furniture to facilitate the association's training activities targeting beneficiaries in local communities.

## Social Protection Unit News

Thirteen projects were contracted during the third quarter for a total amount of US\$762,693. Unit activities conducted during this quarter in different sectors were as follows:

### General

The unit designed and implemented four workshops on "The

### Special-Needs Groups

Activities targeting Special-Needs Groups aim to provide institutional capacity building and technical training for NGOs working with such groups:

- Members of Amer and Aqbi NGO, which works with socially marginalized groups, attended a training course in administration and secretarial skills;
- Twenty participants attended a training workshop in NGO management and communication skills from the following organizations: The Deaf (San'a'); al-Noor (Dhamar); Amer and Aqbi (San'a'); Physically Disabled (San'a').
- Another NGO management and communication skills training was implemented with 18 participants from a number of organizations working with the blind in San'a', Ibb and Wadi Hadhramout.
- A training course in sign language took place in Dhamar with the participation of members from al-Irada NGO and teachers from two schools. The course is part of a project aimed at integrating hearing-impaired children into public schools.
- A training workshop in teaching and mainstreaming blind students in public schools. Participants came from Zabid training center and al-Noor center in al-Mukala.
- Six trainees from the Inclusive Educational Department in the Ministry of Education departed to Amman Jordan where they will participate in a nine-month course. Upon completion of the course, they will constitute a national team of trainers. The project is funded by SFD in partnership with the Italian NGO Movi Mondo.

## Small and Micro Enterprise Development Unit

### Al-Hodeidah Micro Credit Program (HMCP)

A workshop was conducted on "strategic planning" for the program in San'a' between September 4<sup>th</sup> - 7<sup>th</sup> 2001. Representatives from the program, al-Hodeidah branch of the Yemeni Women's Union and Social Fund staff discussed the preparation of the HMCP Strategic Plan for the coming five years.

### Hais Savings and Credit Program (Second phase)

Disbursed 115 loans raising the total number of borrowers to 201 (of whom 60% are female) with a loan portfolio totaling YR8 million. Meanwhile, the number of savers participating in the program reached 283. The program also organized a training course in managing small enterprises. Twenty female participants from Hais, Zabid and Bait al-Faqih attended.

### Wadi Hadhramout Micro Credit Program

Lending activity in this program began in June 2001. The demand for the service has increased, and to date 40 borrowers from Sayun and surrounding towns have benefited.

### Sana'a' Micro Credit Program

A needs assessment has been completed to study the feasibility of establishing a credit program in the city of San'a'. The study recommended establishing a micro-credit program that would provide financial services at selected locations in San'a'.

### Taiz Micro Credit Program

An agreement between the SFD and al-Tadamoun Islamic Bank on the principles of contracts has been reached for the Taiz Micro Credit Program. The program will provide financial services to poor micro-entrepreneurs in the city of Taiz.

### Training Activities

A training course focusing on the preparation of loan applications, loan follow-up and collection procedures for credit officers was conducted. Eighteen participants from different SFD credit programs participated in this course.

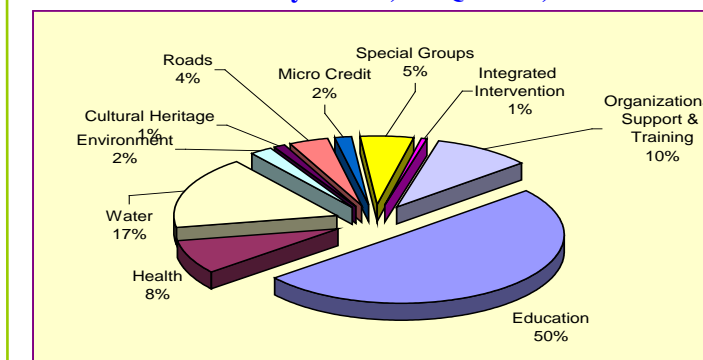
