

Editorial

The fourth quarter of year 2000 coincided with the end of the First Phase of the SFD operations during which the SFD did very well as far as its overall performance is concerned. The SFD's capacity had been strengthened during the previous years, enabling the SFD to shorten the implementation period of the First Phase from five years to three years and allowing it to proceed firmly with great confidence to implement the Second Phase of its operations during the years (2001-2005).

The Second Phase operations are believed to be a real challenge, which may not be the subject of high expectations or underestimation. However the SFD is very confident of its capability to meet the challenges of the Second Phase. This high level of confidence in the SFD and the strength possessed are drawn from the competent, enthusiastic and dedicated SFD staff obtained during the implementation of the various activities in participation with the local communities. It also stems from the valuable support provided to the SFD by the numerous donors whose partnership with SFD is deepening with time, and constituting the corner stone of success, continuity and the expansion of SFD operations.

Prince Talal Ben Abdulaziz in the SFD



SFD is regarded as the first organization in Yemen to carry out micro-credit schemes in a systematic manner.

During the visit, SFD Managing Director gave a brief presentation about the SFD activities and achievements.

Twenty million NLG contribution to the Social Fund

On 29th of November, Mr. Abdulkarim Al-Arhabi, SFD Managing Director with H.E Mr. Bert J. Ronhaar, Netherlands Ambassador to Sana'a, signed a twenty million NLG (Dutch Guilders) contribution for increasing and expanding the school facilities in urban areas. Dr. Yahya Al-Shoaibi, the Minister of Education witnessed the signing of the Agreement. The amount contributed by the Netherlands Government is considered to be generous and a positive response to the proposal submitted by SFD in early October 2000 to the Netherlands Embassy in Sana'a to reduce crowding in educational facilities in urban areas through expanding schools or building new ones.

Education:

In the framework of the program to reduce crowding in urban schools, the SFD has signed an agreement with the Ministry of Education to expand 24 primary schools in Sana'a City, which will include the building of 70 classes for 30700 students in minimum. The intervention includes providing all schools with the necessary annexes such as laboratories, libraries, activity rooms....etc. as well.

Cultural Heritage:

During the quarter the unit finalized the preparation of a project designed to pave 8000m of lanes in the old city of Sana'a. This intervention will include changing the old water supply network and lighting the streets that will be payed.

Water Harvesting Projects- Phase 2

The number of projects under implementation during this quarter reached 15; 7 in AL-Mahweet, one in Amran, and 7 in Sana'a. These projects consist of 51 cisterns. The SFD's interventions include rehabilitation, expanding existing cisterns, or building new ones, when necessary, in order to meet the needs of the beneficiaries during the dry season. The interventions also aim at improving drainage channels, fencing the cisterns and installing hand pumps.

Other Water Projects:

The number of water projects (excluding the water harvesting projects) under implementation reached 42 projects. With these, the total number of projects implemented during the quarter was 57 with an estimated cost of US\$3,291,441.

The Unit financed and Implemented 8 projects during the 4th quarter of the year 2000. These included:

- One training course to improve the capacities of the charitable associations and accountants in women NGOs' in the Basics of Accounts and Book-keeping.

It is worth mentioning that SFD is putting special efforts into improving the management capacity of relevant bodies to assure quality and sustainability. For this purpose and with the enthusiasm of the Ministry of Social Affairs, SFD is advocating and supporting a new management mechanism for government -managed centers. The new mechanism provides a partnership with the government, NGOs and private sectors in the management and finance of facilities that provide social services to the disabled.
