Editorial

At the onset of the first quarter of this year, the SFD inaugurated the second phase of its operations with an ambitious target plan consisting of 700 projects to be implemented during the first year which are expected to cost about US\$ 47.5 million.

During the second phase, SFD will emphasize, within its circle of interest, training and capacity building programs, support special needs groups and the continuation and expansion of water harvesting programs. At the same time SFD will stress progress in the development of community capabilities through their active participation in the implementation of the various projects.

The wide areas covered by the SFD operations involving diversity of activities which required a strict monitoring system to be put on place, to control the quality of project implementation in order to achieve the expected results.

Along with the above considerations, which are meant to ensure the continuation and sustainability of projects in providing the required services, it is also important for SFD to design a mechanism for the purpose of impact assessment for its various interventions and to examine to what extent these interventions have contributed to the improvement of the living conditions of the target groups and communities, which is the essence of objectives for which SFD was created.

*The 2nd Meeting of the Board of Directors in the year 2001

The SFD Board of Directors held its 2nd meeting for the year 2001 on Wednesday 6/6/ 2001. The meeting was chaired by H.E. Mr. Abdulkader Ba Gammal , Prime Minister, Chairman of the Board. The main issues of the meeting were:

Review and approval of the Draft Plan for the year 2001.

Discussion of issues relating to SFD targeting policies, financing of the 2nd phase, and the relationship with the Local Authority.

Signing a secondary agreement of more than one billion USD

Unit news

Infrastructure Unit

During the second half of April 2001, the unit organized a field visit to monitor projects. The field visit took place in coordination with Aden branch. Eight completed projects in Aden, Lahj, and Abyan governorates were visited. After the visit, the unit agreed on a working schedule with the Aden branch and the beneficiaries to deal with issues that were resulted from the visit.

During the second quarter of this year, the unit announced eight national tenders for importing 70.000 school desk benches to be distributed to needy schools in different governorates for reducing crowding in urban schools. At the same time, the unit conducted a field visit to verify the needy schools, which were recommended by the Ministry of Education. The Netherlands government funds this project.

The unit has contributed to a group-field visit to the old city of Zabid. The group included different institutes interested in the cultural heritage such as (ministry of culture, Hodiedah Governorate office, World Bank, GTZ, KFW and the Urban Cultural Heritage Programme. The purpose was to view the city's situation which is exposed to a continuos deterioration and the upsetting of the unique traditional building of the city. The group have reached to a preliminary urgent work plan to support the infrastructure and rehabilitate some sights using the financial, the administrative and the technical capacities of the groups according to their specialisation.

At the end of June, the unit organized a workshop on: SFD Policy in Constructing Road Feeders: Engineering Criteria for Designing. Branch Managers, road consultants, project officers, and the head of infrastructure unit have participated in the

Training Unit

Nineteen projects were contracted during the 2nd quarter of the year 2001, four of them have already been completed, and fifteen are still under implementation. The nineteen projects contain:

A - Training:

- ☐ A detailed proposal for upgrading skills of SFD staff and consultants on community participation has been developed and approved. It is expected to start the training on June of this year.
- ☐ The analysis of the first phase of integrated Intervention program has been finalized. The four areas to be covered at the pilot phase are identified: Ahwar /Abian; Rab'e Al-Duss, Luhaia / Hodiedah; AlNayef, Ghashm /Amran; and Allayl Neighborhood / Sana`a capital.
- The framework for phase two of the Integrated Intervention program is prepared. Consultants to be involved in this phase are identified. Phase Two will involve two main activities: conducting a base-line data survey for all four areas; and working with relevant communities for need assessments, prioritization, problem analysis ,project identification, and the formation of community -based development committees.
- The Unit has contracted 6 projects in the health sector, and 3 projects in the sector of groups of special needs.

Training Unit

Six projects were contracted during the 1st quarter of the year 2001. These include:

C. One project of Technical Support for governmental organizations The SFD provides support to the National Museum (Second Phase) in the field of enhancing the documentation of the antiquities' collection database. This intervention is considered as a guarantee to the transformation of the system from manual to automated archiving. This will enable the museum technical staff to film, document and enter in

the database about twenty thousand objects in both Arabic and English languages. The entered data will be linked with the objects' pictures, in addition to providing the necessary hardware and software needed for this purpose. The project will also provide training for the museum's technical staff. A consultant hired by the SFD will conduct the training. It will concentrate on aspects related to running the system and the development and administration of the network.

The SFD had formerly financed the First Phase through a separate project. The former intervention concentrated on the creation and development of a database for recording and documentation of the antiquities' collection and historical sites. Such work has been done by means of cards difficult to read or analyze. Necessary

The program will also work to develop the savings and credit policies and is expected to disburse 450 loans and provide saving services to about 700 women.

Al-Saih Credit Program:

SFD signed an agreement with Al-Saih Agricultural Cooperative to extend the agreement signed earlier by the two parties related to Al-Saih Credit Program. The cooperative will concentrate in the coming period on collecting the over-due loans caused by the frost which hit the area in December 2000.

Appraisal of New Projects:


