#### Signing an Agreement of YR1.5 billion

Under the auspices of H.E. Abdulgader Ba-Jammal, the Prime Minister/ Chairman of the SFD Board of Directors, an agreement was signed between the Ministry of Planning and Development and the Social Fund to provide the SFD an additional YR1, 474,239,666 (totaling US\$8 million) financed from the sale of American Food Aid. #### **Units News**

#### **Training Unit**

During the second quarter of 2001, nineteen projects were contracted - four have already been completed and fifteen are still under implementation. The nineteen projects included:

#### Training

• Training beekeepers in the improved techniques - twentyfive participants from Taiz Governorate took part in the course.

• Training of Trainers (ToT) course in agriculture - twentyone trainees from Hadhramaut (both from the Wadi and coastal districts) attended the course.

• Reinforcing the capacity of SFD staff and consultants in Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) - four separate courses will be conducted between June 30<sup>th</sup> and the month of July. Participants include SFD staff from headquarters and from seven branch offices, as well as some consultants who assist SFD in such tasks.

• Training of financial officers and accountants in basic accounting and bookkeeping practices - twenty-four cooperatives from the governorates of Lahi, Abyan and Al-Beidha benefited from the course.

#### Workshops

• New methodologies and techniques in teaching adult learners - three workshops were implemented attended by 45 leading committee members in various NGOs from the governorates of Sana'a, Dhamar, Al-Hodeidah, Al-Beidha, Taiz, Ibb and Aden.

Standardizing procedures and interactions with local NGOs attended by decision-makers from the Ministry of Social Affairs and Labor, General Department of Associations and its governorate branch offices.

Organizational Support to NGOs

• Training of Trainers in pottery, weaving and embroidery and necessary equipment and furnishings - ten associations benefited to facilitate implementing their on-going activities.

#### Technical Support for Governmental Organizations

The SFD is providing support to the Military Museum in Sana'a through designing and installing a database for historical artifacts. SFD support includes providing hardware and software components, necessary equipment and to install the database, computer network and train museum technical staff.

#### Infrastructure Unit

• During the second half of April 2001, the Unit organized a field visit to monitor eight completed projects in Aden, Lahj and

• During the last week of June, the Unit organized a workshop on "intervention policies, procedures and design in feeder roads sector". The workshop aimed at enabling SFD's branches to screen, develop and supervise implementation of feeder road projects. Participants in the workshop included branch managers, consultants and unit staff.

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#### **Social Protection Unit**

#### Health

During this quarter, the unit contracted 30 projects among which:

projects to improve the admitting capacity of the • governmental health institutes such as constructing an institute in Al-Matnah, district of Bani Mater, Sana'a Governorate; constructing a Nursing School in Al-Saddah, Ibb Governorate; expanding five health institutes in Aden, Al-Mukallah and Abyan; constructing a training institute for medical equipment maintenance in Sana'a; constructing accommodations for female students at Al-Hodeidah Health Institute.

• Supporting the equipping of the infant ward at the Republican Hospital in Sana'a and constructing an infant ward at the Yemeni-Swedish Hospital in Taiz;

• Constructing additional clinic and a garden at the Psychiatric Hospital in Taiz.

- Special-Needs Groups
  April 29<sup>th</sup> May 20<sup>th</sup>, the Unit conducted a training course for mainstreaming disabled children in public schools, 20 trainers attended.
- 2. Providing financial support to the National Conference for Children, which took place in May 30<sup>th</sup> in Sana'a.
- Integrated Interventions

A survey for data base collection for the targeted areas for the integrated interventions was conducted to be used for future impact evaluation.

Along side, four weeks of fieldwork have been taken place in the targeted areas to assist local communities to identity their priorities and to establish development committees to implement their priority projects. PRA methodology was used in the process.

#### **Other News**

- 1. A new female officer joint SFD to support Sana'a branch in community participation and special-needs groups projects.
- 2. One of the unit's staff attended a three-week course in Liverpool, UK on Gender and Health.

#### Water and Environment Unit

#### Rain Water Harvesting

Since June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2000, this program has served 339 villages, or 51%, of its planned target of 668 villages in the second phase of the program. At this rate of implementation the program target will be completed by June 2002. Projects have included 370 newly constructed, rehabilitated or expanded cisterns. With an average expansion capacity of 400 cubic meter per cistern and total harvested rainwater totaled 148,000 cubic meter.

#### Environment

During this quarter, the Unit is implementing three projects in this sector, with total commitments of US\$178,000.

#### Institutional Capacity Building

The Unit organized a training course on "Internal and External Sanitation" - 30 SFD staff and consultants attended. The course was organized in cooperation with the Environment

On May 5<sup>th</sup>, 2001, the Unit presented a paper on "The Social Fund's Experience in the Rural Sanitation Projects" at a workshop organized by the Ministry of Local Administration and the World Bank. The workshop took place on the occasion of inauguration of the Sana'a Rural Water and Sanitation Project.

#### **Small and Micro Enterprises Development**

#### Micro Finance Training Course

• From April  $7^{th} - 12^{th}$  the Unit organized a training course on micro finance in the city of Al-Hodeidah. 33 participants representing partners of the SFD attended. During the course several issues were discussed including sustainable micro finance services, indicators and portfolio management. The participants conducted site visits to several clients of Al-Hodeidah Micro Credit Program.

#### Al-Hodeidah Micro Credit Program (HMCP)

• Last April, Mr. Saleh Aeish was appointed as the new manager of the program. Saleh joined the program after attending a training course in micro finance.

• The Program started developing its loan portfolio system. Additional functions have been added to integrate the loan portfolio and accounting systems and develop several programs including a payroll and incentives program.

#### Appraisal Visit to al-Mukallah

• A mission from the Unit conducted a visit to the city of Al-Mukallah to appraise requests received by SFD. The mission visited financial institutions and met with micro entrepreneurs including women. The mission recommended that SFD continue researching the possibility of establishing a micro finance program in Al-Mukallah.

#### Savings and Credit Program (Hays)

During this quarter the development of financial, credit and saving policies of the project were completed. A consultant completed a draft of the new literacy curriculum and trained project facilitators on literacy issues.

#### Al-Odain Beekeeping Project

• Al-Odain Beekeeping Project organized two training sessions for fifty-three beekeepers. The sessions trained beekeepers in modern beekeeping methods. Beekeepers who attended the training are eligible for project loans. Thus far, the project has disbursed 130 loans.

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
